QUICK GUIDE FOR DELEGATES

The main function of annual Scottish Conference is to provide a platform for members and affiliates to initiate debate and decide upon policy matters. This is done through policy motions submitted to the Conference Arrangements Committee (CAC) in advance of Conference.

Motions can be split into three categories

- Motions proposed policy by affiliates or party units which if passed become Scottish Labour Party policy.
- Emergency Motions issues which have arisen after the deadline for submitting contemporary motions to Scottish Conference.
- Constitutional Amendments
- motions dealing with the procedures by which the Scottish Labour Party is organised and refer to internal matters relating to our constitution, rules or standing orders.

All votes are normally carried out by a show of hands by delegates only, however some votes, such as Constitutional Amendments and Rule Changes will require a card vote. The Chair of Conference will explain this process, where required.

Speaking in Debates

All delegates and ex-officio delegates

(Councillors, Parliamentarians and members of elected party bodies) are entitled to speak in debates. The Chair of Conference will decide which delegates can speak, usually taking into account time considerations.

Additional information and the text of motions will be contained within the Conference Arrangement Committee Reports, available from the Scottish Labour information stand each morning of Conference.



Subject: Finding a UK-wide solution to the DRS roll-out

Summary: In June 2023, the Scottish Government confirmed that its deposit return scheme (DRS) - originally due to be launched in the August - would be delayed until at least October 2025. This decision followed apprehension from the UK Government about the impact of the scheme on the UK internal market, alongside practical concerns from industry about both the scheme's rollout and its potential to increase costs.

It is, however, widely acknowledged that the deposit return scheme will come with many environmental benefits for Scotland, including increased recycling and a reduction in littering and carbon emissions.

Join our panel session as we consider how Scotland can deliver a successful DRS scheme as soon as possible, which addresses environmental and business concerns, and works productively alongside equivalent UK schemes.

Subject: Unlocking Fiscal Autonomy in Scotland

Summary: Scotland needs a serious and informed debate about how to use and reform the taxes which the Scottish Parliament controls. Without a tax strategy, it is easy to focus on successive short-term fixes which are neither fair nor efficient and lead to unintended consequences. At the same time, we face the reality that public services are not sustainable at current levels of taxation. Running out of time to tackle Scotland's alcohol crisis



Scottish Health Action on Alcohol Problems (SHAAP) is a partnership of the Medical Royal Colleges in Scotland and the Faculty of Public Health and is based at the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh (RCPE).

SHAAP provides the authoritative medical and clinical voice on the need to reduce the impact of alcohol-related harm on the health and wellbeing of people in Scotland and the evidence-based approaches to achieve this.









Organisation: The Poverty Alliance and the **Living Wage Foundation**

Subject: Fair work, fairer Scotland: Using the labour market to lift people out of poverty

Summary: In our wealthy nation, it's wrong that people are struggling to find work that gives them the income and stability they need to be free from poverty. Over two-thirds of children experiencing poverty live in a household where someone is in paid work.

Decent, secure work with a fair wage can help us tackle poverty. But what are the steps that are necessary at the Scottish and UK level to make that a reality?


